Banu Gibson and the New Orleans Jazz All-Stars Saturday, May 15, 2021 at 2:00 pm A Live Stream Event

Special one-time only live web-cast!! Internationally renowned New Orleans band leader and singer, Banu Gibson, will lead a trad jazz quartet of New Orleans Jazz All Stars. This one-hour live, web-cast concert will originate from the New Orleans Jazz Museum on Saturday, May 15 at 2 p.m. This is an all-too-rare opportunity to see and hear Banu. She last performed in-person for Tri-State in November 2015. The Jazz Museum is delighted to originate the event because it puts New Orleans players on the band-stand where they long to be, but because of the more than year-long pandemic, have been almost entirely shut out.

Tri-State Jazz Society is participating as a co-sponsor and co-funder of this event. The initiative was spurred by Washington D.C. area's **Potomac River Jazz Club** as part of its 50th Anniversary year celebration. Joining to present the concert are **Queen City Jass Society** based in Buffalo, NY, and the **Basin Street Regulars** of Pismo Beach, CA, organizers of the annual *Jazz Jubilee By the Sea*.

Drew Nugent is a jazz musician, hailing from the city of Philadelphia, and bandleader of the ensemble "Drew Nugent & the Midnight Society." Nugent and his ensemble specialize in traditional or "Hot" Jazz, from the 1900s to the 1940s, with the main area of focus being the Jazz Age - the Roaring 20s. Nugent's instruments of choice are the cornet and piano, plus his own vocals. He is also known for his playing of an odd contraption called the "Hot Tea-Kettle," or the "Teapot Trumpet" as some fans have named it. Drew made his debut in 2005, at age 19, on the classic NPR radio show *A Prairie Home Companion*, where he placed 3rd on the "Talent from 12-20 Contest." As far as the band goes, the Midnight Society, returning for the first time since their TSJS debut in April, 2010, has been together performing the "good ol' tunes," earning a reputation as one of the best bands in the "trad" style.

Domingo Mancuello Sunday, April 18, 2021 REVIEW by Jim McGann



Several years ago, I was engaged in a conversation with bandleader Tex Wyndham. We were talking about the differences of Ragtime and Stride Piano. Mr. Wyndham summarized the comparison with one sentence: "One swings...and the other does not." Essentially, you can put sheet music of a popular rag in front of an accomplished pianist, totally unfamiliar with Ragtime, and if they could sight read, could play the rag. The challenge is when Stride piano enters the discussion, the same pianist may play the music as written, but would it swing?

Then I was introduced to Domingo Mancuello.

On Tri-State's website there was a video of Mancuello performing "Whispering." As I listened to the pianist's interpretation of the Schonberger composition, I was amazed at the intensity, emotion, and direction generated during the performance. Not only did it swing, but he managed doing all these things while maintaining the same tempo. This had the makings of a great concert, I thought.

And it was. Mancuello's pianistics (to borrow James P's description) made the rags swing and added an exhilaration not often found in Ragtime performances. Admittedly, the pianist is not restricted in the ragtime genre, but featured heavy elements of stride, vaudeville, even comedy in his performances. To summarize, he was capturing a period of time. In this case, the 1920s.

It was an education. Mancuello discussed Ragtime as a style, using "When You Wore A Tulip" from playing the rag as written with all its boxy restrictiveness to adding certain technique to make the piece come alive. And swing. There was a feel to the music that was expected when the rag was performed. "Genre is just a fake human construct", added Mancuello, when concluding the demonstration.

Recalling the aforementioned Tex Wyndham's tendency to perform the rarely heard chestnuts of the period when leading his Red Lion Jazz Band, Mancuello offered similar rarities. With standards included in the program like "Sweet Georgia Brown," "When You're Smiling," and "Ida (Sweet as Apple Cider)," Mancuello included L Rene Villars' "Chicken Foot Bob," Charles L. Johnson's "Crazy Bone Rag," and my favorite, "My Canary Has Circles Under His Eyes." While the former titles are always a welcome listen, it is nice to hear something not performed as often which may be equal in quality, if not better. The wonder of it all was this young man, with a shock of brown hair falling in front of his eyes, banging out these songs as if at a cutting contest, and with the enthusiasm that one would wish



more of his generation would latch on to. There was not one more moment in this concert where this appeared to be "just a job" to this pianist. Ah, to capture that energy.

In capturing the period of the 1920s, Mancuello's vocals simulated the vocal stylings of the artists popular during that time - Seger Ellis, Irving Kaufman come to mind - high tenors with a heavy emphasis on enunciation. In the 1920s, this style of singing was popular, and part of the landscape. However, this approach does not transcend time well, but this side of the performance did not ruin the concert for me - there was too much else in this concert to enjoy and marvel.

So does Ragtime swing? After listening to Domingo Mancuello, I'm a believer. One would hope others of his generation follow his lead, if not as musicians, but as appreciators of the treasures of music produced in the decade known to us as the Roaring '20s.

May 28 (1928) Red McKenzie and His Music *Box* recorded in New York City on the Okeh label.
Personnel: Red McKenzie - vocals, comb and leader, Joe Venuti - violin, Eddie Lang - guitar, Eddie Condon, banjo
"My Baby Came Home," "From Monday On"

May 1 (1929) Blind Willie Dunn's Gin Bottle Four recorded in New York City, on the Okeh label.
Personnel: King Oliver - cornet, J.C. Johnson - piano, Eddie Lang - guitar, Lonnie Johnson - guitar, Hoagy Carmichael - percussion and scat vocals, unknown 2nd percussionist
"Jet Black Blues," "Blue Blood Blues"

May 14 and 23 (1929) [Phil] Napoleon's Emperors recorded in New York City City, for the Victor label. Phil Napoleon - cornet and bandleader, Tommy Dorsey - trombone, Jimmy Dorsey - clarinet and alto sax, Joe Venuti - violin, Frank Signorelli - piano, Eddie Lang - guitar, Joe Tarto - bass, Stan King (5/14) or Ted Napoleon (5/23) - drums.

"Mean To Me," "My Kinda Love," "Getting' Hot (Waterloo)," "Anything (Thunder In My Dreams)," "You Can't Cheat A Cheater"

May 1 (1931) The Mills Blue Rhythm Band (listed as Blue Rhythm Boys) recorded in New York City, on the Banner label. Irving Mills created this band as a "replacement act" for Duke Ellington and Cab Calloway, when the latter bands were on tour, and home venues like the Cotton Club needed a band who could perform in the style of said bands.

Personnel: Edgar Hayes - pianist, arranger, leader, Wardell Jones, Shelton Hemphill, Ed Anderson trumpets, Harry White, Henry Hicks - trombones, Charlie Holmes, Ted McCord, Castor McCord - saxes, Benny James - banjo, Hayes Alvis - bass, Willie Lynch - drums, Chick Bullock - vocals* "*Star Dust," "*Poor Minnie the Moocher," "Blue Rhythm," "Black And Tan Fantasy"

May 3 (1935) Russ Morgan and His Orchestra recorded in New York City, for Columbia. Morgan, before he was better known for his "music in the Morgan manner," was a talented arranger, having arranged for Jean Goldkette and Fletcher Henderson, and led a jazz-swing band prior to his commercial success.
