Danny Tobias and Friends Sunday, January 16, 2022 **REVIEW by Jim McGann**

Danny Tobias - trumpet, alto horn, vocals, leader Vince Giordano - bass sax, string bass, tuba, vocals

Dennis Lichtman - violin, clarinet

Conal Fowkes - piano Jim Lawlor - drums, vocals

Before introducing a song, Danny Tobias began with "Let's do another of those good ones," in the manner of Louis Armstrong's introduction of a tune. With Tobias, along with the company of Vince Giordano, Conal Fowkes, Dennis Lichtman and Jim Lawlor, it is safe for me to say that this concert is one of the "good ones."



On a day where an inevitable winter storm would shorten the party, Tobias and crew made one temporarily forget the storm (as well as other anxieties in this day and age). It was simply a joyous two hours of music, performed excellently by all contributing. All of the participants had performed before for TSJS, save for Dennis Lichtman, who is a welcome addition to the trad jazz world.

Most of the material was familiar to TSJS audiences, save for the exotic "Lena is the Queen of Palestina," and a minor J.C. Johnson composition, "Take Your Tomorrow and Give Me Today." It was standard trad jazz repertoire given new life thanks to Dan Tobias and his Friends.



The first set opened with "At The Jazz Band Ball," taken at a good tempo, with Lichtman playing with a Pee Wee/Edmund Hall growl but an original technique. James P. Johnson's "If I Could Be With You (One Hour Tonight)" was a vehicle for Tobias alto horn, backed by Vince Giordano's arco string bass, and would utilize the horn on the next tune, "My Gal Sal," in an unusual trading of fours with Giordano's tuba. Jim Lawlor's only vocal of the afternoon, "Wrap Your Troubles In Dreams," provided a humorous exchange between Tobias' trumpet and Lichtman's clarinet, both ending the conversation with each horn trilling at one another!

"Yellow Dog Blues" attempted to engage audience participation by cheering after an anticipated clarinet break. It took a while for most of the audience to catch on. The performance was noteworthy for Tobias' use of a "Similac" (that's what it read on the can label) can mute, providing dark barking effects and Giordano playing the lowest note on the tuba ("I can't get any lower," said Vince).

At this point, it was time for a solo piano piece from Zambian born Conal Fowkes. The piece was a relatively unknown composition by James P. Johnson entitled "Jingles." It was a bright, swinging piece with hints of ragtime and deserves to be better known. Tobias joined Fowkes, creating a duo interpretation of "Embraceable You." With the full band back on stage, on a swinging version of "Dinah," Fowkes incorporated Fats Waller's solo from his 1935 Victor recording (noteworthy in itself for being from the last recording session at Victor's Trinity Church studio in Camden, New Jersey) in his solo.

The second set calmed down after the "party on" atmosphere of the first set, but interesting soli and arrangements continued. On "Rosetta," in an exchange of fours with Tobias, Giordano vigorously slapped the aluminum bass and even banged on the body for percussive effect. "I May Be Wrong" and a Brown, Tobias, and Stept composition, "Comes Love" provided vehicles for Lichtman's violin – like his clarinet, you can hear shades of influences from the trad jazz elders but it in summary, it is his own voice.

When Vince Giordano introduced J. C. Johnson's "Take Your Tomorrow and Give Me Today," sentimental memories for this writer were awakened. One of my first articles for TSJS was about Johnson (way, way back in 2002). Back then, there wasn't much info on Johnson, just a little more than a few capsule bios. In 2022, you can now find photos of the composer, among other information. How far we have advanced.

The aforementioned "Lena is the Queen of Palestina," and the closing "Swing That Music" brought a return of the "party" atmosphere that permeated the first set. Then we braved the impending storm. Danny Tobias and Friends provided an oasis of joy in these times of uncertainty.

Coming in March Ethan Uslan - Solo Piano

Hailed by the Chicago Tribune for his "vivid musical imagination" and "deep understanding of far-flung performance practices," Ethan Uslan is a ragtime/jazz pianist and raconteur. as well as a 3-time winner of the World Championship Old-Time Piano Playing Contest (yes - that really exists!). Ethan, who made his TSJS debut in 2014, has performed all over the USA, including at the Ravinia Festival, Scott Joplin Festival, and on NPR's A Prairie Home Companion. He has also practiced his art in England, Ireland, Switzerland, Netherlands, Belgium, France, and Cyberspace, where his jazzed-up treatment of Beethoven's "Für Elise" has gone viral.

Aside from solo work, Ethan has appeared with symphony orchestras, jazz bands, improvisational comedy groups, and even a clown show. At the age of 9, he began studying classical piano with Faina Litenzon in his hometown of South Orange, NJ. As a teenager, he took jazz piano lessons from Dan Crisci and in college (Indiana University) he studied classical piano under Edmund Battersby. Ethan got a master's degree in historical musicology (also at Indiana University), and his most important mentor in that field was jazz historian Jeffrey Magee, who has written books on Fletcher Henderson and Irving Berlin.

Ethan Uslan currently lives in Charlotte, North Carolina where he presents his music and storytelling on his very own podcast - The Carolina Shout. His concerts are filled with passion, humor, virtuosity, and a deep love for America's rich musical past. His vast repertoire includes original arrangements of Civil-War era songs, African-American Spirituals, New Orleans Jazz, 1920s Charlestons, blues, stomps, Harlem stride piano, swing, Cuban rumbas, and jazzed-up versions of classical masterpieces.

February 26 (1926) Louis Armstrong and His Hot Five recorded in Chicago, on the OKeh record label. Personnel: Armstrong - cornet and bandleader; Kid Ory - trombone, Johnny Dodds - clarinet, Lil Hardin (Armstrong) - piano, Johnny St. Cyr - banjo.

"Georgia Grind," "Heebie Jeebies," "Cornet Chop Suey," "Oriental Strut"

February 4 (1927) Frank Trumbauer and his Orchestra recorded in New York City, on the Okeh record label.

Personnel: Trumbauer – c-melody sax and bandleader; Bix Beiderbecke – cornets; Bill Rank - trombone, Jimmy Dorsey, Doc Ryker – saxes; Paul Mertz – piano; Howdy Quicksell – banjo; Eddie Lang – guitar; Chauncey Morehouse - drums.

"Trumbology," "Clarinet Marmalade," "Singin' The Blues"

February 28 (1933) Joe Venuti-Eddie Lang Blue Five recorded in New York City, on the Columbia record label. The last recordings of Venuti and Lang.

Personnel: Venuti - violin and bandleader, Jimmy Dorsey – cornet, clarinet and alto sax; Adrian Rollini – bass sax, goofus, piano and vibraphone; Phil Wall – piano; Lang - guitar

February 29 (1936) Gene Krupa's Swing Band recorded in Chicago, on the Victor record label.

Goodman – clarinet; Jess Stacy – piano; Allen Reuss - guitar, Israel Crosby – bass; Helen Ward – vocals*

February 1 (1939) Harry James and the Boogie Woogie Trio recorded in New York City, on the Brunswick record label.

Personnel: James - trumpet, Pete Johnson *, Albert Ammons * - piano; Johnny Williams – bass; and Eddie Dougherty - drums.
