Inspired by the noble jazz pioneers Louis Armstrong, Bix Beiderbecke, Duke Ellington, Jelly Roll Morton and their colleagues, David Ostwald's Louis Armstrong Eternity Band breathes life and passion into America's own great art form.

Since 1980, this acoustically electrifying group has appeared nationally and internationally in varied settings - currently in the twenty-fourth year of its open-ended weekly Wednesday evening engagement at New York City's Birdland, at the 2021 Newport Jazz Festival, at Lincoln Center's Midsummer's Night Swing, at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, at Jazz in July at the 92nd Street Y, at Lionel Hampton's New Orleans-style funeral procession, and at four appearances at Scotland's Nairn International Jazz Festival.

A beloved Tri-State tradition returns with the All-Star Jam! Amateur or professional musicians from our community are invited to sit in for a song or two with Dave Robinson and his Conservatory Classic Jazz Band, a top Washington, DC-based group that plays regularly for the Potomac River Jazz Club and for Tri-State too.

Pre-registration for jammers closes June 1st. If you've missed the deadline, email the jam leader Dave Robinson at jazzteacher@wap.org. Walk-ins on the day of the jam may be accommodated if you check with jam leader Dave Robinson prior to the start of the concert.

A jam tune selection list, including keys, will be posted on our website. Most of the list is drawn from Bob Rawlins' The Real Dixieland Book (Hal Leonard) and page numbers will be listed.

- Musicians should bring their own instruments (piano and drums are provided)
- Pre-registered sit-ins should sign in at the door, and will be admitted free of charge. Family members and friends will be admitted with our member rate of \$10.
- Dave will call up the sit-ins to play, per the distributed set list. Please be ready to take the stage and play when it is your turn, and leave the stage promptly at the end of your assigned tunes.
- Walk-in jammers will also be admitted free of charge and will be invited to sit-in if time allows.
- Priority will be given to those who pre-registered.

# Stephanie, Paolo, and Friends May 2025 Review by Bill Hoffman



It's probably not a good idea for the concert scheduler to review concerts he scheduled, but since our regular reviewer was not present, I took it upon myself to chronicle the event.

The piano duo of Stephanie Trick and Paolo Alderighi made their third appearance at Tri-State on May 18, but this time, at their request, bass and drums were added to form a quartet. They do this occasionally, often at festivals and in concerts in Europe. Their request yielded excellent results.

Bassist Rob Adkins and drummer Jay Lepley have both played for us before with other bands (Dan Levinson's, Emily Asher's, and maybe others), but not together and never with Steph and Paolo. In fact, neither the pianists or "rhythmists" had ever met before. But I had often seen both of them and when Paolo asked for suggestions, those were the names I gave him. Having known both men for many years, I was quite confident of a good match up. The four had a brief review of how the set list would be played as the audience filed into the fellowship hall at HUMC; Paolo had sent them lead sheets beforehand.

The concert opened with just the piano in Hoagy Carmichael's "One Morning in May," one of his

lesser-known tunes written in 1933. Then the quartet took over with the 20s anthem "Charleston," written by stride piano master James P. Johnson. A tune or two later, Jay and Stephanie traded solo breaks on Irving Berlin's "Always," very well executed.

In both sets, Paolo and Stephanie had solos, he on "Tea for Two" and she on Fats Waller's "Viper's Drag." Their playing styles are quite different, yet when they're together they make it work without it seeming mismatched. Paolo's style is rhythmic yet not overbearing, often reflective of his hero Erroll Garner. Stephanie's forte is stride and boogie woogie; she is perhaps the best exponent of those styles on the scene today. Neville Dickie, no slouch himself in either genre, views Stephanie as his biggest "threat."

During the first set there was a tribute to Django Reinhardt with two of his compositions, "Nuages" (clouds) and "Douce Ambiance" (literal translation: soft atmosphere). Everyone got a chance to shine here. The inspiration for this was Stephanie and Paolo's concert in Marseilles the day before coming back to the US for a 10-day 11-concert tour in our neck of the woods. Eight of those concerts were at retirement communities.

The second set opened with perhaps the best-known tune by the now-forgotten composer Al Piantadosi, "The Curse of an Aching Heart." Many of his compositions have Italian or Yiddish themes. S&P played separately on this number much more than I have seen them do elsewhere, and I have watched them on dozens of occasions at festivals and concerts. You see, I am their host and chauffeur when they are 'round these parts. I also get to watch them practice.

A few tunes later Paolo played his Erroll Garner tribute with "I'm in the Mood for Love" and "Mambo Carmel," which he re-titled "Mambo Haddonfield." Stephanie accompanied him with an egg shaker on the latter number, which I was not familiar with. This was done in a more modern style than we are accustomed to hearing, but they made it enjoyable.

Steph and Jay teamed up for a lively version of Gershwin's "Liza" before the official end of the concert with "The World Is Waiting for the Sunrise." The audience's ovation elicited an encore, as it often does. As often happens at

their concerts, this is a 5-minute-or-so improvised riff, often given a name associated with the occasion, but this time it remained nameless. Everyone had a chance to solo and the number came off as if thoroughly rehearsed, yet these encores are always created on the spot, never to be played again.

Stephanie and Paolo's performances are as much about the visual as the aural. It's a good thing they're married—to each other—the way they literally crawl over each other at the keyboard. It goes without saying that I will be inviting them back, the only unknown being whether they add accompanists.
